BORDER LEADERS PROVIDE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR REAL, EFFECTIVE BORDER SECURITY

Experts Stress That Immigration Reform Is Critical To Border Security

Washington, D.C. - The National Immigration Forum along with a coalition of border leaders will host a press conference on Capitol Hill on Wednesday, May 12th, featuring Arizona Congressman Raul Grijalva, local elected officials and border community members. Leaders will discuss recent events at the border and will announce a set of comprehensive policy recommendations for improving security in the border region.

Border leaders will emphasize that there is a "right way" to border enforcement. A comprehensive approach that includes fixing the immigration system is needed to address security concerns along the Southwest border. The recommendations are set to inform federal policy makers following the unveiling of the Senate Democratic framework for immigration reform calling for increased border enforcement, a path to legalization for unauthorized immigrants and a new employment verification system.
